STATUS UPDATES (MAY) - BY LOCSEC RODGER MORRISON



Greetings fellow Mensans. First, let me announce that there will not be a May monthly meeting due to the Memorial Day holiday on the last weekend of the month. Rather, we will have a meeting on the Saturday following, which is June 4th, at Asia Bistro and Seafood in Montgomery (near Taylor and Vaughn).

At our last meeting, one of the things we discussed was the possibility of Mensa working with other organizations to put on a pay-per-plate banquet and silent auction. The proceeds from this effort will go to help replenish the Governor's Emergency Relief Fund (GERF) following the recent tornado outbreak. In order to keep the funds in Alabama, this fund was chosen rather than one of the National or International relief organizations (Red Cross, etc.). The GERF needs to be replenished as soon as possible or it will not be available to help our fellow citizens of Alabama should there be another

disaster this year (Hurricane Season starts 1 June).

We are now at the point where I need to ask for volunteers and get everyone up to speed. We will be working with three student groups at Troy University in Montgomery. The Gamma Beta Phi Honor Society, the local student chapter of the Society for Human Resource Management, and also the student History and Social Science Club. We will be lead on this project, but we are not alone. Here is what we have worked out so far:

1. On the second Friday evening in June (June 10th), we will have a planning meeting (location and time to be announced later). We will choose a specific date for the event at that time.

2. After we meet and hammer out a plan, we begin gathering items for the auction. My first preference is for art and cultural pieces, which would probably bring a higher dollar, but that is just my preference and not the voice of the majority. Again, as this is a team effort, it will be discussed at the planning meeting. We will need to meet artists, business owners, etc, face-to-face when soliciting donated items. I have a place to store whatever is donated that is secure, but we need to work out some details first. More on this at the planning meeting.

3. We are looking at a timeframe of the end of July for the banquet/auction. A 230 seat banquet hall has already been

donated, and a caterer has already been identified, but we will need to work out menus, pricing, etc.

4. I have identified a possible banquet speaker (one of our state senators) who happens to live just down the street. I would also like to arrange for some quality entertainment. We would like to have a representative and others from the governor's office present in order to present a check to from our chapter of Mensa and the student groups assisting. This will give us a LOT of quality visibility. So, here it is. We need volunteers for the following:

- Soliciting for, picking up, and delivering items for and to the silent auction
- Selling banquet tickets
- Setting up for the banquet/auction (banquet is mostly set up by the caterers)
- Helping on banquet day with the silent auction itself.
- Ushering on banquet day.
- Cleanup when it is over.

If you are able to help out with this effort, please email me directly and include your interest and contact information. In particular, I encourage our young Mensan's to assist with this effort.

We have notified Mensa of our recent officer changes and are waiting to hear back regarding a resent Montgomery area proctor form for me. Nothing else to report at this time. There have been some changes to our website (Thanks to Brent Gourley!!)

American Mensa online: What do YOU want to do today? (From Mensa's eNews)

If you're a member who's been online a while, you may recall American Mensa's (*earlier web sites*). Of course, you'd recognize the current site that debuted in 2005 – until recently, that is. With each of these sites, we've taken a major step forward for our Web presence, often including a redesign of the site itself. 2011 brings another occasion for the improvement of our primary site at www.us.mensa.org, though you won't see as much of a redesign as a change in the menu and navigation with a number of extended features!

Over a two-year period and with the input of many members in multiple evaluation stages, our Web team has been diligently working on what we've referred to internally as a “renavigation” or re-menuing of our primary Web site. Others have likened it to pulling all of the books off the library shelves (thousands, actually) and then reshelving them, occasionally building new shelves along the way.

During the past year, our members, officers and staff have provided information on how they would sort the Web site, the terminology they would use, and even their preferences for top menus vs. side menus. The input we've received from them has been invaluable – though we won't be using the Dewey Decimal System!

What's new and different? The menus have been renamed and reorganized. There is a mobile interface (we're still tweaking it!). InsideAML as a separate Web site is no longer, and its content has been merged into the main site under the LEAD menu. There is still a “My Mensa” menu for our members, but much of your site customization will occur in a right-side menu of tools available throughout the site. Then there's the search engine. With a new site and new software comes a new search engine, and well – admittedly – it just works.

MENSA SURVEY NOW AVAILABLE ONLINE

In our monthly meetings, we have discussed ways that we can make our group more active with doing things as a group. That is, doing something other than just eating out once a month. So, rather than take our best guess at what everyone wants, I decided to put together a short survey online that would take less than 5 minutes for each Mensan to complete. This should tell us a) what people think about why they are a member, b) what types of activities they are interested in, and c) what opinions everyone has as to how we can make our chapter better. As of today, only seven (7) chapter members have completed the survey, so there are not enough responses with which to formulate an answer. I ask that each member go to the website below and complete the survey. The only personally identifiable information we require in the survey is either your email address and your Mensa membership number. This is only to prevent duplication of responses. The survey is accessible by going to <http://www.trustc3.com> and click on "SURVEYS". You will see the link to the Mensa preferences survey. Click that and follow the directions accordingly. I hope to have the results available in the next newsletter, however, preliminary responses suggest that at least a few of our members are interested in outings to the: ballet, symphony, planetarium, zoo, legislature, art museum, space museum, history museum, theater, day at the lake, baseball game, and more. There are also a few folks interested in the newsletter puzzles and in our eList being used for sending out puzzles. After we get more responses, we should have a better idea of what folks would be interested in doing, so please participate and complete the survey! RM

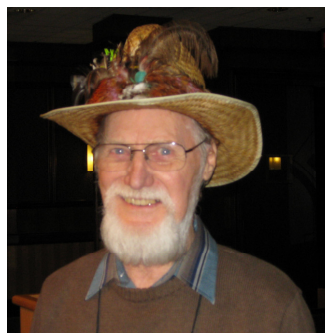
